Reflection

Sometimes I wonder what it must be like to live at the Equator, where every day of the year has 12 hours of dark and 12 hours of light. There is a balance about it that appeals to me, like the Yin/Yang Symbol, but there is also a feeling that losing the seasons would be too high a price to pay. As we enter the darkest quarter of the year in Southern England it is tempting to seek sun and warmth in lighter climes, but also tempting to settle down indoors and appreciate how fortunate we are in having comfortable shelter from the cold and damp, even while we look forward to passing the Winter Solstice and searching for early signs of spring.

The dark and light times in our lives don't always follow the seasons. We can be grieving over loss at blossom time or enjoying the Festive Season at midwinter with friends and family, for example. Personal circumstances are more likely to affect us at any time of year than the amount of sunlight (although I realise that people who suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder have a specific problem). But the state of the world also has its effect, and at present the world seems to be going through a very dark period. There is war in Ukraine and Gaza to name but two; there are extremities of drought and flood, causing famine; and there are dangerous levels of toxicity in our oceans, atmosphere, and land. How can we find balance in ourselves when the world is in such an unbalanced state?

Perhaps we can't. Perhaps the best we can do is to find glimmers of light in the darkness, to keep hoping and praying that peace and justice will come to our world, and to have faith that loving human kindness will prevail over suffering. I struggle to do that, and I'm not always successful. Yet I am heartened by some words of Maya Angelou that are apt for the prevailing November weather: "Even the heaviest storm eventually runs out of rain." I'm not ready to give up on the power of faith, hope, and love. Not yet.
